

Addison County Responds: Flood Relief

In July 2023, historic levels of rain affected businesses, homeowners, and people living in many areas of Vermont. While Addison County seemed to avoid catastrophic damage caused by July's rainfall, the area did not fare as well in early August when more isolated storms brought heavy rainfall. The areas of the state affected by July's flooding have received a Federal Emergency Disaster Management Agency (FEMA) disaster declaration, but Addison County has not.

In the absence of Federal relief, United Way of Addison County has established the **Addison County Responds: Flood Relief** fund to support Addison County residents who have experienced home and/or property damage from this summer's rainfall and need financial assistance. This fund is made possible in part thanks to a contribution from the VT_Flood_Response

&_Recovery_Fund_2023 of the Vermont Community Foundation.

Deadline: Applications_may_be_submitted until November 15, 2023.

Review Process: A volunteer group of community members will review all applications and recommend award amounts to UWAC. Decisions will typically be made within one week of receipt of the request. Priority will be given to applicants that have:

• Significant documented home/property damage

• Experienced financial hardship as a result of flooding damage

Grant Size: Individual households may apply for up to \$1,500*

* The Steering Committee has the discretion to make grants larger than \$1,500

Who is Eligible: Residents of Addison County who experienced home or property damage to their home/ property caused by the July and/or August 2023 rainfall are eligible to apply. (Support must be for a home/ property located within Addison County.)

What We Fund: Whenever possible, payment will be made to a third-party vendor, contractor, etc., to partially or wholly cover repair costs. (Applicants will be asked to provide a quote with their request.) Payments may be made directly to individuals at the discretion of the Steering Committee.

Reporting Requirements: There are no formal reporting requirements, but we'd love to hear how things are going if/when you find the time. No stories will be shared with our donors/community without express permission from recipients.

A time of transition

Dear Friends of UWAC, This past year was — in many ways — joyful. Family gatherings, live

music, local theater, in-person meetings, and introductory handshakes returned slowly, restoring a sense of normalcy to

our everyday lives. By the time May 11, 2023, rolled around and the COVID-19 public health emergency was declared over in the United States, some people may have been surprised learn to that declaration hadn't already been made. You'll also read how UWAC has responded to these needs, shifting and increasing our community investments, the awareness of local issues, and the partnerships to strengthen the response. A trust-based aproach to fund requests We lowered the barriers for

small organizations to apply

UWAC's Board of Directors approved \$132,000 in Community Impact Funding (CIF) for the 2023 priority area of Education. This increase of over \$36,000 was made possible by the community's strong support of UWAC's fundraising efforts.

UWAC focuses its efforts in three areas: Health, Education, and Financial Stability. Any organization receiving a CIF grant from UWAC must clearly align with one of these areas of need. Every year, UWAC enters funding relationships under one of these focus areas and makes three-year grants. A diverse team of dedicated Addison County citizens carefully review and evaluate applicants and make program funding recommendations to UWAC's Board of *(See Impact, Page 2)*

Instead of scoring written applications, UWAC's volunteer review team spent time looking local data, at researching applicant organizations, and preparing for site visits that ultimately allowed reviewers to gain a deeper understanding of each organization's work and how/if UWAC could best support them with limited local its philanthropic dollars. the new application approach was key in welcoming 20 new nonprofits to submit their Letters of Interest in funding. "We took a careful look at our funding structures and systems and determined that the barrier to applying may leave out smaller organizations doing big work," Van Voorst said. "We expected to have

> some new-to-UWAC organizations apply - but didn't expect to have 20! There is both great need and great work being done in Addison County."

Bringing Grant Dollars to Addison County

United Way of Addison County has been the recipient of both State and Federal grants that allows us to invest in the community in different ways. See the description of those grants below, and visit unitedwayaddisoncounty.org/advocate for updates on our work.

Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Support Program

The Drug-Free Communities (DFC) Support Program is the nation's leading effort to mobilize communities to prevent youth substance use.

Funding Agency: Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

Amount: \$125,000 Annually (\$625,000 over a 5-year period, 2019 - 2024)

Local Programs: DFC dollars support the Addison County Substance Use Prevention Coalition, serving all youth in Addison County with specific focus on grades 9-12. Initiatives within the DFC grant include substance use prevention community education and resource sharing. DFC supports the Coalition to help build capacity, engage partners, and provide trainings to our youth-serving organizations.

Partnership for Success (PFS)

PFS helps reduce the onset and progression of substance misuse and its related problems by supporting the development and delivery of state and community substance misuse prevention and mental health promotion services.

Funding Agency: Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Amount: \$285,615 from 2022-2023 (\$1,002,449 over a 5-year period, 2019-2024) Local Programs: In Addison County, PFS funding is used to collect data and inform families of protective factors that will prevent or delay youth substance use. The PFS grant supports our annual Celebrate Safely program in which all Addison County Juniors and Seniors receive a shirt with a reminder to "Celebrate Safely" before prom & graduation, both high risk times for substance use.

Homelessness Health Equity (HHE)

This capacity building grant from the State of Vermont supports the Addison County Homeless Health Equity Alliance (ACHHEA), a partnership of 10 local service providers and/or people with lived experience, in developing an action plan to systematize and streamline access to care for homeless individuals and families in Addison County.

Funding Agency: State of Vermont Department of Health

Amount: \$83,536 (over a 2-year period, 2022-2024)

Local Programs: Development of an action plan to increase access to healthcare among unsheltered.

Vermont Vaping Grant

The State Vaping grant was introduced to address the rising concerns and challenges around electronic vaping products (EVPS) and use of nicotine. Funding Agency: State of Vermont Department of Health

Amount: \$30,000 Annually (\$90,000 over a 3-year period, 2022-2025) Local Programs: UWAC is supporting schools, parents, and community members in understanding the harmful effects of nicotine and EVPs on youths development and mental health. This information is shared through community events, parent engagement, and directly with youth grades 3-12.

Sober Truth on Preventing Underage Drinking (STOP) Act Grant

The STOP Act Grant is crucial in honing in on the need to reduce underage drinking and will provide resources to youth, parents, and guardians about the harm of alcohol on brain development and performance in school.

Funding Agency: Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)

Amount: \$60,000 annually (\$240,000 over a 4 year period, 2023-2027)

Local Programs: Funding will be used to promote protective factors, cultivate substance-free environments, and support Trauma-Informed Systems Training for our community. Therefore, for the next four years, each of Addison County's three public high schools, including Middlebury Union High School, Mt. Abraham Union High School, and Vergennes Union High School, will receive \$5,000 towards Project Graduation to promote substance-free events during high-risk times for underage drinking.

Addison County goes to Washington, D.C.

What does it mean to advocate and support the community?

It means to elevate and amplify voices! Last week, United Way of Addison County staff, including Sylvie Choiniere (Director of Advocacy), Celia Heath (Public Health and Advocacy Coordinator), and Helena Van Voorst (Executive Director), had the chance to meet with Federal Delegates during the United Way Advocacy Forum and Capitol Hill Day. They met with Representative Becca Balint, Legislative Staff from Senator Peter Welch's Office, and left materials with Senator Bernie Sanders regarding priorities

that need Federal support. During these conversations, they talked about priority areas for Addison County, including housing, workforce, healthcare access, food insecurity, transportation, and our aging population. Information gathered from the 2023 Addison County Data Meeting through funded partners and other local community organizations was shared with the offices to amplify the need for federal support. UWAC staff was there to amplify the voices of our community and bring awareness to the long waitlist for healthcare and mental health services due to the workforce and the housing crisis, coupled with the average age of residents rising and the need for additional services.

Additionally, UWAC staff discussed the need for support around the United Way Worldwide priorities, including the Help Act to support 2-1-1 funding nationally in order to provide this service 24/7. The continued support of the 2023 Farm Bill would help support SNAP Benefits and address food insecurity nationally and locally. However, UWAC Staff raised concerns about Delta 8 and Delta 10 synthesized cannabinoids derived from hemp that have psychoactive effects and are being manufactured into candies, fruit drinks, and other youth-targeted items. Coalitions across the nation are looking for Federal Support to ban these cannabinoids from the market. Another

priority included the Charitable Act to incentivize philanthropy by providing additional federal tax incentives for charitable donations for individuals, foundations, and businesses. This would help non-profits recoup from Covid-19, in which there was a major decrease in donations. Lastly, UWAC staff thanked the Federal Delegates for their continued support for substance use prevention and mental health needs and their openness to conversations and support for their constituents.

What is the goal of these meetings?

UWAC's goal in meeting and developing relationships with Federal Delegates is to be a resource and quickly respond to data needs (anecdotal, quantitative, and qualitative). These relationships help connect the community to the ears of federal support and ensure the needs of Addison County are seen and heard.


Area students celebrate safely



Addison County Youth Survey

The 2023 Addison County Youth Survey provides data that helps inform and improve substance misuse prevention programs for Addison County youth and famlies. 908 middle and high school students in Addison County schools participated in the survey, providing UWAC with some of the data below.




